Football Team wins the GLIAC title

The Ashland University athletic program added yet another historic season to their program. Coach Owens and the football team clinched their first outright GLIAC championship title in five years and the third title overall in six seasons. The Eagles were 11-2 overall and 9-0 in the conference. After clinching the title, the Eagles moved into playoffs where they were faced with the twotime defending national champs and the best defensive team in the country. The team beat Northwest Missouri State 21-18 and moved on to the second round against Harding where they were defeated 34-24. The end of the season also ended the era of, possibly one of the greatest quarterbacks in program history, Travis Tarnowski. Tarnowski was awarded GLIAC player of the year and the NCAA Division II Conference Commissioner's Association Super Region 3 Offensive Player of the Year. During the season, he was also achieved 10,000 career touchdowns and 10,000 passing yards. Coach Owens was named the GLIAC Coach of the Year.

Indians 22 game winning streak
